Below, we have a list of prompts accompanied by a selection of films and texts for both the junior (year 10 and 11) and senior (year 12 and 13) for the arts and culture section of the competition.

We have options for French, Spanish and German. To enter write an essay in **English** of 800 to 1,200 words (as stated above.

Essay prompts for all films and texts

Write a review of your chosen film/text.

Pick a scene you feel is most signicant from your chosen text. Discuss why it is signficant, and how it contributes to the plot as a whole

Analyse a character from your chosen text What reaction do they provoke from the audience? From other characters?

How much should we consider national context when we analyse foreign works? Discuss with reference to your chosen work.

History is always key to understanding works. Discuss with reference to your chosen work.

How does the soundtrack emphasise the themes of your film?

What theme of your chosen work is most significant and why?

Could this story have taken place in any other country? Why/why not?

Why would you recommend this text to someone who does not speak the language?

Below are a list of prompts relating to society and politics. They can be answered with reference to a specific country, or more broadly as a social phenomenon.

For this section you can choose to write in English, Spanish, French or German. Essays should be between 800 and 1,200 words

Essay prompts

Can you be truly fluent in your second language?

Can we live in a world without borders?

What is the significance of minority languages in an increasingly interconnected world?

Is language manipulated in a political sphere? Answer with reference to a specific country

Does globalisation impact cultural development? Answer with reference to a specific country

The existence of one universal language, instead of diverse languages, would improve international relations. Discuss.

Ancient history and mythology can often influence the modern day. Explore the link between the past and present with reference to a specific country Lost in translation: is meaning doomed to be exclusively found in the native language it belongs to?
